Curiosity Radius

 A Neurinative lens

Definition

Curiosity Radius describes the practical distance a question can travel: the range of people, ideas, perspectives, and disciplines someone can realistically reach while exploring an idea.

Our curiosity is no longer limited by geography.

It is shaped by connection.
